Annette Gray, Buchanan Gray, Wellington

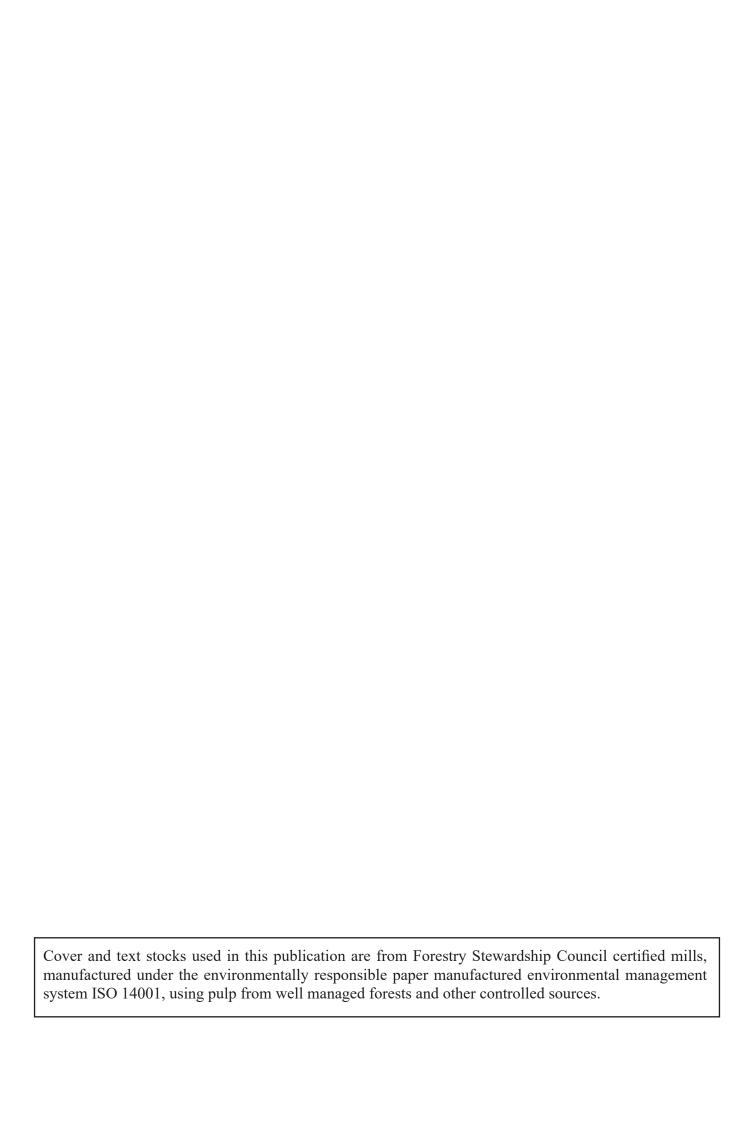
