### ***Richard Boast, Victoria University, Wellington***

Richard is a reader in law at Victoria University where he teaches courses in property and natural resources law. He is also a practising barrister specialising in Waitangi Tribunal claims and the Maori Land Court. Richard has co-authored textbooks on Maori land law and New Zealand legal history, and has written numerous articles and papers dealing with the foreshore issue. He was one of the leading claimant counsel in the recent Waitangi Tribunal foreshore and seabed hearings.

### ***Dr Paul McHugh, Cambridge University, England***

Paul is a Fellow of Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge where he has taught law for over twenty years. This year he becomes the first Ashley McHugh Ngai Tahu Visiting Professor of Law at Victoria University of Wellington. His prize-winning publications pioneered the application of common law aboriginal title to the New Zealand setting and he is internationally regarded as the foremost authority on this topic. His book *Aboriginal Societies and the Common Law* will be published by Oxford University Press in 2005.
