CHAIR



The Hon Justice Bruce Robertson, Court of Appeal, Wellington

Appointed a High Court Judge in 1987, Justice Robertson was president of the Law Commission from 2001 - 2005. For the last decade he has presided in the Court of Appeal of Vanuatu. A barrister and solicitor between 1978 and 1988 and a barrister from 1988 to 1997. Justice William Young took silk in 1991, was appointed to the High Court in December 1997 and to the Court of Appeal in November 2003. He was appointed President in 2005.

An honours graduate of QMC, University of London, Judith was called to the Bar of the Middle Temple in 1970 and admitted as a Barrister in NZ in 1982. Appointed a Queen's Counsel in 1995 she was awarded the ONZM for services to the Legal Profession in 2002. She is a member of the Ministry of Justice Criminal Practice Committee.



William Akel, Partner, Simpson Grierson, Auckland
