### **Emeritus Professor John Burrows QC, Law Commission, Wellington**

John Burrows QC is an emeritus professor of the University of Canterbury. He was Dean of the Faculty from 1980 to 1986, and Pro-Vice-Chancellor of the university from 1992-2000. He was appointed a Law Commissioner in 2007.

Professor Burrows' main interests are media law, statute law and the law of contract. He has written or co-written *Media Law in New Zealand*, *Statute Law in New Zealand* and *Law of Contract in New Zealand*. He also contributes to Todd's *The Law of Torts in New Zealand* and has been a contributor to Lexis Nexis *Commercial Law*.
